snapshot of the latest developments, publications, and meetings related to humanitarian healthcare ethics, our goal with this newsletter is to document and provoke: exchange, discussions, (re)considerations and (re)evaluations of ethical needs, standards, space, and practices in a range of humanitarian healthcare contexts.

The Humanitarian Healthcare Ethics Network, HumEthNet, was inaugurated on November 22-24, 2012, in Hamilton, Canada at the Humanitarian Healthcare Ethics, hhe, Forum, hosted by the hhe Research Group with funding from CIHR. Participants from a variety of disciplinary, organizational, professional, and country backgrounds engaged in an intensive deliberative forum on the development of realistic applications for ethics in humanitarian healthcare practice. The resulting international, interdisciplinary, interprofessional Network proposed a working statement to describe its aim:

*A community of practice committed to developing & using research, education, policy, and/or tools to address ethical challenges in humanitarian healthcare in order to reduce practitioners' moral distress and improve ethical practice and decision-making at multiple levels.*

This newsletter, *HumEthNet Reflections*, is intended to sustain, strengthen and expand the relevance and reach of this community of practice. In every *Reflections* newsletter, you will find highlights from the hhe website, the profile of a network member, the latest publications by network members, new resources relevant to humanitarian healthcare ethics, and calls for conferences and papers. The newsletter is available in both electronic and pdf formats and subscription to the newsletter is free. ## In Focus: Dónal P. O'Mathúna, Ph.D.

Dónal P. O'Mathúna (Ph.D.) is Senior Lecturer in Ethics, Decision-Making & Evidence in the School of Nursing and Human Sciences, Dublin City University (DCU), Ireland. He is an Affiliated Scholar with the DCU Institute of Ethics,

Chairperson of the DCU Research Ethics Committee and the ethicist on St. James's Hospital, Dublin ethics committee. Dónal has degrees in pharmacy and bioethics, and his research interests include: disaster bioethics (ethical issues delivering healthcare and conducting research after disasters); nanotechnology ethics; emotions and ethics, especially the role of literature and narrative in ethics teaching and training; Christian ethics; and systematic reviewing of healthcare interventions. Dónal has published peer-reviewed articles and book chapters on bioethics (see [www.BioethicsIreland.ie](http://www.BioethicsIreland.ie)) and Cochrane systematic reviews. Current book projects include editing *Disaster Bioethics: Normative Issues when Nothing is Normal* (Springer) and an evidence-based book on herbal remedies based on his *Irish Times* columns. Dónal has authored *Nanoethics: Big Ethical Issues with Small Technology* (Continuum, 2009), and *Alternative Medicine: The Christian Handbook*, updated and expanded edition (Zondervan, 2007).

### DISASTER BIOETHICS ACTION

As of last year, Dónal has been the lead investigator for the European Union funded COST Action (IS1201) on Disaster Bioethics. Launched in October 2012 with a four-year budget of just over €500,000, this Action draws on the strengths of European scholars, international humanitarian agencies, medical relief personnel, and others in 25 participating countries to advance research and training and improve decision-making in disasters. Triage practices and long-term consequences of humanitarian healthcare interventions on beneficiaries are key issues the team will address. Ensuring aid sent in disasters is appropriate is another concern. As Dónal notes in a recent *Irish Times* article, "Just because we want to do good and feel a lot of compassion for people, it doesn't necessary mean they need what we want to send them," (November 13, 2012). The work of the Action is being carried out within four Working Groups focused on: (1) Healthcare ethics, (2) Bioethics, culture and moral theory, (3) Disaster research ethics, and (4) Ethics and governance. The Action's first working meeting will be at DCU on 25-26 April 2013, focused on identifying disaster ethics issues. ## hhe Forum | Hamilton November 22-24 | 2012

### At Issue

**Why** do we need humanitarian health ethics (as opposed to e.g. medical or public health ethics)?

**What** are the ethical challenges of humanitarian healthcare practice?

**Where** are the target opportunities for adding tools and/or other kinds of support for ethical humanitarian healthcare practice?

### Highlights

- The hhe Forum inaugurates the Humanitarian Healthcare Ethics Network or *HumEthNet*, with links to the research and network website: <http://humanitarianhealthethics.net>
- The forum features 29 participants with representatives from the World Health Organization (WHO), Médecins Sans Frontières (MSF, Canada, Sweden, and Switzerland), Red Cross Canada and the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC), as well as aid workers and academics from around the world
- 3 working groups are formed to develop research, policy, and education initiatives

### Key Discussions

**Reasons and justifications that support serious consideration of hhe should not be taken for granted, but made explicit.** These include: i) to help respond to and support moral distress amongst field workers; ii) to ensure better, more ethical, care delivery and decision-making processes; iii) attention to ethics can increase organizational credibility and help limit legal liabilities.

### Humanitarian healthcare ethics: more than an individual ethos

A commitment to hhe needs to be formalized throughout humanitarian healthcare projects and structures. While a temporal approach (before, during, after the field) to improving hhe is useful, such an approach needs to be coupled with broader strategies to avoid implying hhe starts and stops with individual actions and decisions.

### Moral space requires community collaboration

Participants agreed that in order to make and maintain a moral space for the practice of humanitarian healthcare ethics, ethical interventions must work in collaboration with host communities.

The following working groups were formed and continue to collaborate to develop research, policy, and education initiatives: 1) **Theoretical** underpinnings for hhe; 2) **Educational** and case study initiatives for hhe; 3) **Operational** resources and policies for hhe.

## hhe Origins...

Since 2009, a multidisciplinary team of researchers has been collaborating with the aim of helping to clarify the ethical issues that are present in humanitarian healthcare practice.

We began with a cluster of qualitative research studies, and swiftly began to see that the studies needed to be pulled together and a programme of research began to grow. Four years on, we invited a collection of scholars and practitioners to meet to help expand the goals of hhe research. This community of practice met in Hamilton, Ontario, in November 2012, and have since followed up to become a network of interested researchers and practitioners.

The Humanitarian Healthcare Ethics Network, or HumEthNet, is the multidisciplinary network created to exchange ideas and further collaborations to advance debate and generate knowledge to help inform ethical practice in humanitarian healthcare.

The humanitarian healthcare ethics research group, composed of Drs. Lisa Schwartz, Matthew Hunt, Lynda Redwood-Campbell, Laurie Elit, Elysée Nouvet, along with graduate students Sonya de Laat, Leigh-Anne Gillespie, Veronique Fraser, Catherine Olivier and Renaud Boulanger, hosted the 2012 *hhe Forum* that resulted in the *HumEthNet* and the *Reflections Newsletter*.
